2021 Accomplishments:

- Been awarded grants totaling \$139,500, including \$36,000 to Bennington County Regional Commission (BCRC) to support our efforts,
- Submitted an application to the National Telecommunications and Information Administration's Broadband Infrastructure Grant program in partnership with Consolidated Communications Inc (CCI).
- Added Winhall as a member of the SoVT CUD.
- Maintained membership in the Vermont Communications Union Districts Association (VCUDA).

2021 Activities and Plans for 2022

In June 2021 we were awarded a \$139,500 Preconstruction and Capacity Building Grant from the Department of Public Service for technical assistance, legal services, and other operational support. Although the grant was awarded in 2021, the CUD expects to receive the funds in 2022, which is reflected in the FY22 budget.

In July 2021, SoVT CUD signed a Memorandum of Understanding with CCI for a public-private partnership to provide broadband services to unserved and underserved areas in the District. CCI was selected to partner with SoVT CUD through a robust RFQ process and was also the winning bidder of the Rural Digital Opportunity Fund for this region.

In August 2021, SoVT CUD worked with CCI to submit an application to National Telecommunications and Information Administration's Broadband Infrastructure Grant Program in the amount of \$8.1 million to fund fiber to the premises. NTIA award decisions are expected in February 2022, and CCI plans to begin construction in the second half of 2022.

The CUD also plans to work with CCI to apply to the Act 71 Broadband Construction Grant as a supplement or contingency to NTIA. The proposed FY22 budget reflects the grant awards that the CUD anticipated receiving in in 2022.

Under the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), Vermont received over \$1 billion to make strategic investments in critical infrastructure and initiatives throughout the state. The governor's proposal currently calls for over \$250 million of that ARPA funding to be allocated to broadband and connectivity projects. Additionally, \$200 million of Vermont's ARPA funding went directly to local governments and can be spent on a wide range of projects including broadband. ARPA funding and the new Bipartisan Infrastructure Law present an unprecedented opportunity to invest in broadband infrastructure at the state and local level, and CUDs stand to benefit greatly from these investments.

As the year ends, we look forward to building upon our relationships with neighboring CUDs, CCI, VCUDA and other broadband stakeholders to accomplish our mission of bringing high-speed internet to Southern Vermont.

Acknowledgements

All the representatives, alternates, and officers have given significant time and effort to the CUD and deserve respect and gratitude. They have made for an impressive second year.

The CUD has greatly benefited from our partnership with the Bennington County Regional Commission (BCRC). The administrative assistance and expertise in navigating the public funding arena provided by Community and Economic Development Specialist Jonathan Cooper and Regional Planner/Energy Program Coordinator Callie Fishburn has been invaluable. The CUD is especially indebted to BCRC's ability to keep us grounded in the broad development efforts of the region.
